

Recycled Frog Life Cycle Activity

At home activity for children

Materials

- Large size bubble wrap
- Black permanent marker
- Paper egg carton
- Green paint
- Paint brush
- Green pipe cleaners
- Green construction paper or craft foam
- Googly eyes (if you have them)

Procedure


1. Cut out a small section of the bubble wrap and draw black circles in the middle of each bubble to represent frog eggs



2. Cut out one section of the egg carton, paint it green and let dry.




3. Take the pipe cleaners and make 4 individual frog legs out of them.



- 4. Cut a small tail out of craft foam or construction paper.
- 5. Glue googly eyes onto the front of the painted egg carton piece to make your frog.
- 6. Cut a slit in the back end of the frog for the tail and hole punch four places in the frog where it's legs can attach (two in front, two in back).



7. Once everything is dry, you can go through the whole life cycle of a frog from eggs, to tadpole, to polliwog, to adult frog who lays more eggs!



Takeaway:

This is a fun, hands on craft to help children understand the life cycles of a frog and how fun recycling can be.
